#### Dear Ellie.

There is a very deep rooted foundation to the holiday of Purim that takes place on the Shabbos before Purim – tomorrow, February 28. I refer to the Mitzvah in the Torah to remember what Amalek did to the Jewish people historically, going back to the exodus from Egypt. "Zachor" ("Remember") is the word the Torah uses, and which has become the cry that inspires us to ensure no physical or spiritual residue from Amalek impacts us in our daily lives. Indeed, the rise of the evil Haman in the story of Purim is the direct result of the failure to adhere to the Torah's mandate of "Zachor". The message of Purim is both the celebration of our peoples survival, as well as the responsibility to remember the people who orchestrated the potential genocide against our people, G-d forbid. It is for this reason that each and every year on the Shabbos before Purim, we read the "Zachor" portion in the Torah reminding us of our responsibility with regards to Amalek.

Very importantly, this portion that we will read tomorrow in shul is the only Torah portion that is a "Biblical" Mitzvah. This is in contrast to all other Torah readings all through the year – including the Torah readings on the High Holy days – which is Rabbinically mandated.

This all leads me to encourage you to join us for services tomorrow. Considering the uniqueness of this Mitzvah, please consider making the effort to attend services tomorrow at 10:30. Together, we will fulfill the Mitzvah of "Parshas Zachor" being read from the Bimah!

On Purim we have 4 opportunities to perform 4 unique mitzvos:

Be sure to hear the Megillah twice, once on Wednesday night and then again on Thursday. (See below for megillah reading times.)

Celebrate a Purim Feast, including bread and wine, sometime during the day on Thursday, with family and friends. (No Kiddush is recited but the wine or vodka is consumed...) Give Gifts of Food, usually a gift basket of ready-made prepared foods, to at least one friend. This should be done individually by each member of the family.

4. Give money to the poor on this day. If you don't have access to poor on this day, we can act as your agent to distribute. You can make your Purim contribution here.

# G-d tells <u>Moses</u> to receive from the children of Israel pure <u>oilve</u> <u>oil</u> to feed the <u>"everlasting flame"</u> of the menorah, which <u>Aaron</u> is to kindle each day, "from <u>evening</u> till <u>morning</u>."

The priestly garments, to be worn by the kohanim (priests) while servinig in the Sanctuary, are described. All kohanim wore: 1) the ketonet—a full-length linen tunic; 2) michnassyim—linen breeches; 3) mitznefet or migba at—a linen turban; 4) avnet—a long sash wound above the waist.

In addition, the <u>kohen gadol</u> (high priest) wore:
5) the *efod*—an apron-like garment made of bluepurple- and red-dyed wool, linen and gold
thread; 6) the *chosher*—a breastplate
containing twelve precious stones inscribed with
the names of the <u>twelve tribes</u> of Israel; 7) the *me'll*—a cloak of blue wool, with gold bells and
decorative pomegranales on its <u>hem</u>; 8) the
tzt/z—a golden plate <u>worn on the forehead</u>,
bearing the inscription "Holy to G-d."

Tetzaveh also includes G-d's detailed instructions for the seven-day initiation of Aaron and his four sons—Naday. Avihu, Elazar and Itamar—into the priesthood, and for the making of the golden altar, on which the ketoret (incense) was burned. Chabad Hebrer School For more info
