Dear friend:

This Sunday, the 14th day of the Hebrew month of Iyar, is called Pesach Sheni - the 2nd Passover.

A year after the Exodus, G-d instructed the people of Israel to bring the Passover offering on the afternoon of the fourteenth of Nissan, and to eat it that evening, roasted over the fire, together with Matzah and bitter herbs, as they had done on the previous year just before they left Egypt. "There were, however, certain person who had become ritually impure through contact with a dead body, and could not, therefore, prepare the Passover offering on that day. They approached Moses and Aaron... and they said: "...Why should we be deprived, and not be able to present G-d's offering in its time, amongst the children of Israel?" (Numbers 9).

In response to their plea, G-d established the 14th of Iyar as a "Second Passover" for anyone who was unable to bring the offering on its appointed time in the previous month. The day thus represents the "second chance" achieved by teshuvah, the power of repentance and "return." In the words of Rabbi Yosef Yitzchak of Lubavitch, "The Second Passover means that it's never a 'lost case'."

So often we hear people's response to getting involved in Jewish practice and observance "it's too late for me... I wasn't raised that way... Why should I start now?".. Along comes the 2nd Passover with its loud and clear message - "It is NEVER too late in Judaism". Every Mitzvah counts and the Mitzvah of each and every Jew is op precious and longed before by the Al-Mighty.



Parshat Acharei-Kedoshim

Following the deaths of <u>Nadav and Avihu</u>, G-d warns against unauthorized entry 'into the holy.'' Only one person, the *kohen godd* ('high prist'), may—but once a year, on <u>Yom Kinput</u>—enter the <u>innermost chamber</u> in the Sanctuary to offer the sacred <u>Actors</u> to G-d. Another feature of the Day of Atonement service is the <u>casting of lots</u> over two goats, to determine which should be offered to G-d and which should be dispatched to carry off the <u>sins</u> of Israel to the <u>wilderness</u>.

The Parshah of Acharei also warns against bringing <u>korbanot</u> (animal or meal offerings) anywhere but in the Holy Temple, forbids the consumption of <u>blood</u>, and details the laws prohibiting incest and other deviant sexual <u>relations</u>.

The Parshah of Kedoshim begins with the statement: "You shall be <u>holy</u>, for I, the L-rd your G-d, am holy." This is followed by dozens of <u>mitzvot</u> (divine commandments) through which the buliness of G-d. These include: the prohibition against <u>idolatry</u>, the mitzvah of <u>charity</u>, the principle of <u>equality</u> before the law, <u>Shabbat</u>, sexual <u>morality</u>, <u>honesty</u> in business, honor and awe of one's <u>parents</u>, and the sacredness of <u>life</u>.

Also in Kedoshim is the dictum which the great sage Rabbi Akiva called a cardinal principle of Torah, and of which Hillel said, "This is the entir Torah, the rest is commentary"—"Love your fellow as yourself."
