



Can We Ever Open Our Eyes After Newtown?

Last Friday, as the surviving children at Sandy Hook Elementary School were escorted to safety they were instructed to shut their eyes.

Are survivors supposed to ever open their eyes to a world that brutally robbed them of their once pure childhood? Are we ever supposed to come to terms with any suffering that we have endured? If we refuse to acknowledge our misfortune, does that chase evil away? Was it more important for the children to keep their eyes closed, or is the focus to keep on marching out of their bloodied school?

There are no words that can possibly express the grief and tragedy of the Newtown massacre. Last Friday early morning 20 children left their homes to go to their loving school but ended up being murdered. How could such a reality ever exist in a G-d's benevolent universe?

Many years ago in Brooklyn, the Jewish community was shocked by the tragic death of Rabbi Lazer Mangel, who was killed in a car accident. He left behind a young wife and unborn child. His father, Rabbi Nissan Mangel, is a Holocaust survivor who survived seven concentration camps.

On the final day of mourning, Rabbi Mangel shared with everyone present a poignant story of Lazer's youth, when the family was granted audience with the Lubavitcher Rebbe. The Rebbe asked young Lazer, then four, to say the Shema Yisroel (a prayer that expresses the essence of Judaism that G-d is One), and the boy eagerly agreed.

But he did not close his eyes.

The Rebbe, suddenly very serious, turned to Rabbi Mangel and suggested, "Whenever your son recites the Shema, he should close his eyes and cover them with his hand."

Now many years later Rabbi Mangel finally understood the Rebbe's sudden change in mood, and his sage advice. The Rebbe, he said, had prophetically instructed Rabbi Mangel on coping with his son's death decades later.

The Shema Yisroel should always be said with eyes closed.

When the surviving children at Sandy Hook Elementary School were instructed to close their eyes as they were lead out of their school that command had a deeper significance. Their innocence had been crushed; their child-friendly existence had been violated. We don't know why they had to undergo this ordeal but their recourse is to continue on, marching toward a happier more pleasant existence. Their eyes should be shut from any painful flashbacks by clinging on to a brighter future.

To honor the souls ripped away by this tragedy, we need to continue their lives by saying the Shema daily and to internalize its potent meaning.

In this week's Torah portion, when Jacob is reunited with his lost son Joseph after a heart wrenching 22 year absence, his response is to recite the Shema. These words gave Jacob hope when he was mourning the demise of his most precious child. There was no looking back just his burning zeal to go on. To leap, plunge and charge forward out of the quagmire of gloom and depression. Jacob knew that he had to live life to its fullest, with his eyes closed to the pain that gripped his heart.

Dear Friends, we have no answers. We can never begin to understand this massacre. No evil can stop us from crying out to our father in Heaven for comfort. We believe in the words of Isaiah that the day will finally come when death is obliterated and G-d will permanently wipe away the tears from every face. We will only then be able to truly open our eyes.
